Philippians 2:1-11

1. Why?

- a. Incarnation
 - i. "in-flesh/meat-thing"
- b. Easy to connect to
 - i. God experiencing existence as we do
- c. Elegance of the language
 - i. Overwhelm us with the greatness of God

2. Background and Context

- a. "So" (Philippians 2:1)
- b. Acts 16:1-40
- c. Philippians 1

3. Philippians 2:1-11

- a. "So" (v. 1) be especially mindful of 1:29, 30
 - i. Suffering and conflict an ongoing reality for Philippian believers
 - ii. The "surprise" of trials and difficulties
 - 1. Paul understands that it is easy to be caught off guard
 - a. Examples in your past week?
 - b. Suffering is a human reality, but unique for the Christian (attention of the enemy)
 - 2. In light of this Paul offers our reasonable response to difficulty when it arises
- b. Response to Suffering/Conflict (v. 1-4)
 - i. "If/Since" (v. 1)
 - 1. "If" questions the reality of something
 - 2. "Since" affirms the reality of something
 - 3. In this passage recall the reality of what I am about to tell you...
- ii. ...namely (v. 1)
 - 1. Encouragement in Christ
 - 2. Comfort that comes from love
 - 3. Participation in the Spirit
 - 4. Affection (literally "bowels, intestines")
 - Sympathy/Compassion
 - iii. "complete my joy" (v. 2)
 - 1. Paul finds joy in the midst of suffering by his constant remembrance of these things
 - 2. Paul finds **fulfillment** (joy to the fullest extent) when fellow believers do the same and do so in unity, not in conflict with one another
 - 3. What does that look like?
 - iv. The "together psyche" (v. 2)
 - 1. Cumbersome sentence in Greek that seems to really emphasize our shared experience as Christians

- 2. Psyche mind, internal being, etc. where we keep our true understanding of who/what we are
- 3. Offering in fellowship who we truly see ourselves to be
 - a. Not letting our individuality/uniqueness divide us
 - b. Not being afraid to be known at the deepest level
 - c. Not being afraid, perhaps, to even allow our self-concept to grow/change/mature
- v. Seeking unity and healing in relationships (v. 3)
 - 1. Nothing from rivalry (selfish ambition an especially political term)
 - 2. Nothing from conceit ("empty glory")
 - 3. Consider others to supersede you
 - a. May or may not be literal reality (think Jesus washing the feet or a good leader)
 - b. But act as though it were
 - 4. Caring for the interests of others (v. 4)
- c. Example of Christ (v. 5-8)
 - i. Invitation to follow in Christ's footsteps
 - ii. When we do what Paul is describing here we are sharing in the experience of Jesus
 - iii. In other words, Christ's experience is something we can relate to on a purely human level
 - 1. Doing something, whether by choice or by force, that takes us completely out of our concept of who/what we are
 - a. Marriage?
 - b. Raising children?
 - c. Public speaking (scrutiny)?
 - d. Practical evaluations (school)?
 - e. Military service?
 - 2. Doing these things and persevering through them to the end deepens our connection to Christ and leads to great reward
 - 3. What did it look like in Christ's experience?
 - iv. Where He was His self-understanding (v. 6)
 - 1. Form of God
 - 2. Equality with God
 - 3. But He chose not to cling to it (grasp onto it selfishly)
 - v. What He did instead of clinging (v. 7)
 - 1. Made Himself nothing (empty, evacuate, divest oneself of prerogatives)
 - 2. Form of a servant
 - 3. Likeness of humankind
 - vi. He did without quitting (vs. 8)
 - 1. Found in human form (i.e., He experienced the self-sacrifice on the God-level)
 - 2. Now He experiences self-sacrifice on the human level by humbling Himself again as a man
 - a. Lived in obedience to God His Father
 - b. To the point of death

- c. Even death on a cross (considered a curse)
- d. Great reward that comes from carrying through to the end (v. 9-11)
 - i. God highly exalted Jesus
 - ii. God gave Him a name above all names
 - iii. God fully endorses that all creation worship Jesus and call Him Lord
 - iv. God receives glory as a result of this
 - v. So, look closely and you can see that God the Father also understands this concept of emptying Himself
 - 1. He gives something to His Son that is His own by nature/right
 - 2. And in making that sacrifice He receives the glory that is His due

4. Conclusion

- a. Reality of suffering and trials of life, especially as we seek to be obedient to God
- b. We can find joy in the midst of suffering by
 - i. Remembering how awesome it is to be Christ
 - ii. Sharing in that reality with other Christians
- c. God Himself fully understands what it means to suffer and to be outside of His "comfort zone"
 - i. When He asks us to sacrifice and be out of our own comfort zone, He is inviting us to share in His own experience
- d. There are amazing rewards for going through this process and not quitting
 - i. Rewards in this life and in the next
