God is Great

God is Great; Lord God Almighty; El Shaddai...we hear it so often in prayers, in songs, in text; yet do we take time so contemplate what God is saying when He declares Himself great? As an attribute, the Greatness of God describes the extent and magnitude of His qualities. When the Bible says God is Great, it is to be understood that God is the greatest, the ultimate, the utmost, the supreme, and above all.

The Bible teaches that God is Great and His years are unsearchable. He is infinite. He has no beginning and no end (Job 36:26; Neh. 9:32; Ps. 147:5). God declares His Great Name (Ezek. 36:23; Josh. 7:9; I Samuel 12:22; I Kings 8:42) and His Great Name is to be feared above all the nations (Mal 1:14). Why? Because there is no god like our Great God. He alone is above all gods (Job 10:6) and He is the Great King (Ps. 47:2; Ps. 48:2; Mat. 5:25). In greatness, He is clothed in splendor and majesty and is worthy of all our praise (Ps 104:1).

God's greatness goes beyond His name. Throughout the Bible and history, we see God's great power and might displayed in creation (Is. 40:26; Jer. 32:17). His great power/might is also associated with His great justice against sin and the wickedness of this world (Ex. 15:7; Ex. 32:11; Jer. 21:5). And yet, God uses His great power to redeem His people (Ex. 32:11; Neh. 1:10) And if that is not enough, God also demonstrates His great lovingkindness toward us. A lovingkindness that is as vast as it is immeasurable. His great lovingkindness is frequently associated with mercy and forgiveness (Ps. 108:4; Num. 14:19; Zeph. 3:17; Eph. 2:4; 1 John 3:1).

So what should our response be to such a Great God whose name is above all names; whose great power created the universe, wields justice, and redeems His people; a Great God who displays such a great lovingkindness and mercy that we receive His forgiveness and salvation? The greatness of God should ultimately lead us to praise and worship (Ps. 145:3; I Chron. 16:25; Ps. 96:4; I Chron. 29:11). It should humble us and cause a sense awe to behold such a Great God who is high and lifted up. After all, we serve an awesome, covenant-keeping God (Neh. 1:5)!

Seven Ways to Pray for Our Church Elders

1. Pray for **Wisdom**. Pray that God would grant the elders of your church the spiritual insight they need to fulfill their duties. It will be to your benefit to be shepherded by men who have been supplied God's supernatural wisdom. (1 Kings 3:9-12)
2. Pray for **Vision**. Pray that your elders will be given a vision for the future of the church that is in line with God's vision. Pray that they hear the voice of the Great Shepherd, leading them as they lead others.
3. Pray for **Holiness**. Satan is always at work attacking men and women at their weakest points. The elders of your church are probably under a greater attack than most. Pray that they will stand their ground against all of the devil's schemes. Pray that they will desire holiness in their inner being. (Titus 1:7-9; Hebrews 12:14)
4. Pray for **Stamina**. Leadership takes a toll. There is always someone or something that needs attention. There are always meetings, phone calls, memos, emails and—did I say—meetings! An elder gets tired in his body and in his spirit. Leading a church can be draining. He desperately needs the strength that God provides to adequately fulfill his ministry. Pray for health, endurance, vigor, and grit for your elders. (1 Corinthians. 15:58; Galatians. 6:9)
5. Pray for **Knowledge**. Pray for an ever-growing understanding of God's Word that he may be able to find the right answers to the inquiries raised by his people concerning doctrine, sound advice, and godly counsel. (Titus 2:7-8; Colossians 1:9-12)
6. Pray for **Unity**. Pray they will live a life worthy of the calling they have received to be completely humble and gentle; to be patient, bearing with one another in love; making every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. (Ephesians 4:1-3)
7. Pray for **Humility**. Pray for our elders as they set the example for us to follow both in humility and gentleness. That they would not "lord-over" but serve in humility. (Ephesians 4; 1 Peter 5:2-4)

A Word from David Shields



The men in the Shields family all have hearing problems. There are two situations that I find the most difficult for me to hear in. The first is in a crowd with a lot of noise. The second is when someone is saying something that I disagree with. But we have all felt that second one, haven't we? Someone begins to share something with us and our heart starts to beat a little quicker. We start thinking through ways to counter the ideas and refute them with better evidence.

The problem is that James 1:19 calls us "to be quick to listen and slow to speak." Sometimes we are slow to speak, but that is only because we are building up our arguments in our heads. But when we start to do this we have already stopped listening.

Alan Jacobs in his book *How to Think* describes this as "Refutation Mode." He says that "in Refutation Mode there is no listening. Moreover, when there is no listening there is no thinking. To enter Refutation Mode is to say, in effect, that you've already done all the thinking you need to do, that no further information or reflection is required."

Ouch. I see myself in that description. James is calling us to resist entering Refutation Mode. Being slow to speak isn't about the amount of time you let someone else talk, but a disposition of the heart.

I have seen this play out practically with one of my brothers. He would constantly say provocative things that he knew I would disagree with. I spent plenty of time in Refutation Mode and then enumerating all of the ways that he was wrong. The problem was that I was not listening and our relationship suffered.

But then I made a shift. I committed to just listening. To taking this verse seriously and being much slower to speak than I wanted to be. I had to actively fight against preparing my arguments and instead just asked questions. I did not ask questions to try and show him how wrong he was, but just to try and understand his thinking. Instead of listening to win, I started listening to understand and love.

What I found was that our relationship improved. Now this does not mean that we still didn't argue, or debate. But instead of focusing on trying to win, I focused on listening well.

This is a Christian attribute that is sorely needed in our day and age. Too many people are talking over each other and never hearing what the other has to say. I wonder how our relationships could improve if we committed to taking James seriously and just listening. What if we approached disagreements as an opportunity to listen and learn instead of chances to fight? What if we were known for how well we listened?

How Great Thou Art

Carl Gustav Boberg (1859-1940)

Carl Boberg was born the son of a carpenter in Southern Sweden. As a young man, he held jobs as a sailor, a lay minister in the Mission Covenant Church, and editor of a weekly Christian magazine, *The Witness for the Truth*. He served in the Swedish Riksdag as a legislator for 20 years.

Originally written as a poem named *O Store God* by the Swedish preacher Carl Boberg at the age of 28 (1885), the poem was translated into German (1907) and then Russian (1912). In 1949, an English missionary named Stuart K. Hine, who traveled through western Ukraine and Russia, translated the Russian version of the poem into English and added two original verses of his own. It is this English translation that is known today as *How Great Thou Art*.

During the Billy Graham crusades of the mid 1950s, Canadian singer George B. Shea and Cliff Barrows popularized the hymn singing it over 100 times. In 2001, *Christianity Today* magazine named it the second most favorite hymn behind *Amazing Grace*.

Think Ability First Duncan's Farmers Market

The Pathway Apartments was one of several properties owned and operated by the Duncan Group Homes in Duncan, Oklahoma; They provided housing for the developmentally disabled. They also provided 24/7 staff to help with meds, doctor appointments, shopping etc. The Pathway Apartments were built about twenty years ago for those able to live independently with help from staff.

When they didn't have enough developmentally disabled people to fill the 20 units, the Duncan Group began to allow seniors to rent the apartments. It turned out to be a great fit. The seniors and D.D. got along great and have been a help to each other. My husband, Bob, and I sold our home and moved into our apartment at Pathways (21st and Beech) in 2006. My husband passed away two years later in 2008. I've lived here happily since.

For a few years, my two friends and fellow TBF'ers Maxine Blystone and Carolyn Hadley and I shared the receptionist job in the office of Duncan Group Homes, and I got to know and love so many of the clients. Around that time Duncan Group Homes changed names to Think Ability First.

Across the street from the apartments is what is now called Power Print where many of the Think Ability First clients have jobs making t-shirts, bags, etc. At one time it was called Power Shop and was where the clients met in the morning to be transported by vans to their workplaces around Duncan. I always enjoyed their laughter and spirit of fun as they arrived for work and waited to load into their vans to go to their work sites.

Not long ago, around 2014, Think Ability First and Power Print merged. Soon afterwards, the Community Gardens, The Market, and Adult Day Center were born. They are all located on the campus at 21st and Beech.

The Market is very eclectic. They have some Amish made products, local grain-fed beef, and fresh free-range eggs. They sell produce grown in the gardens when in season. They also have some interesting items on consignment. Always something new. Sonja Eubanks manages The Market with the help of the Think Ability First staff.

The Community Gardens, tucked in between the buildings, has three greenhouses and a potting shed. The gardeners may borrow tools to tend their raised beds which are for rent at \$40 per season. It's a beautiful, restful place. The clients who work there learn gardening skills and so much more from Director Sheila DeCarlo and her assistant. They now have two huge inground gardens behind two of the group homes where they raise more produce to be sold at the Market and the Farmers Market.

Living in the Pathways Apartments has been so good for me. Living among these dear SPECIAL, special-needs folk has taught me to try and be cheerful at all times as they are. I'm never lonely as I have met them all and know them as my friends. I have made it a point to get friendly with my neighbors across Beech and I can always get help if I need it.

The management has allowed me to enjoy my passion, working in God's greenhouse right here on the corner of 21st and Beech. Having a garden the size of mine is unheard of in a rental, yet here I am in "My Little Corner of The World!" I'm pretty sure God had something to do with it. My intention is to stay right here until God calls me home; however, that may not be God's plan, but I'm happy either way.

A Pregnancy Care Center in Duncan, Oklahoma

Charis: a Greek word meaning grace and kindness

Charis Center opened September 25, 2017. It is a pro-life clinic staffed by a medical director and RN. They offer a variety of support services that are provided by trained staff and volunteers in an atmosphere that is safe, compassionate, and non-judgmental. All of their services are confidential and free of charge.



Charis Center services are free of charge. They include:

- **Pregnancy Confirmation.** Medical-grade pregnancy tests to verify pregnancy. Test results are completely confidential and won't be shared with anyone.
- **Ultrasounds.** Limited ultrasounds to verify pregnancy; determine if it is a viable and healthy pregnancy; and give an approximate date of delivery.
- **Parenting Classes.** Designed to encourage and empower parents. They include prenatal through 18 months old, as well as fatherhood classes. These classes are offered one-on-one with one of Charis' client advocates. For each class completed, the individual will receive Baby Bucks! They can be used to shop in Charis' Baby Boutique for clothes, carseats, diapers, cribs, etc.
- **Adoption.** Adoption is the legal process of transferring parental rights from a child's birth family to an adoptive family. While it's seldom an "easy" decision for a pregnant woman, it can be a healthy, positive experience for everyone involved.

Having a Mary Heart in a Martha World - Joanna Weaver

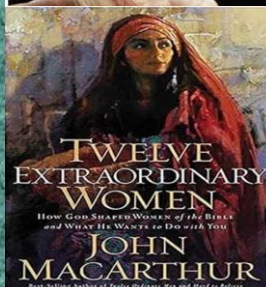

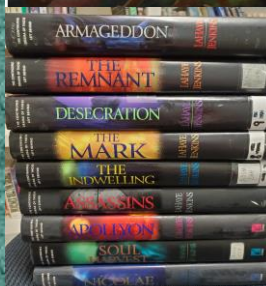

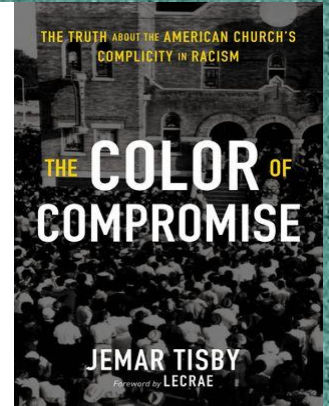


David's Book Recommendations

Like many pastors I am a big fan of books. The following books are all books you can find on my bookshelf and I would be more than happy to lend them to anyone who would like to read them.

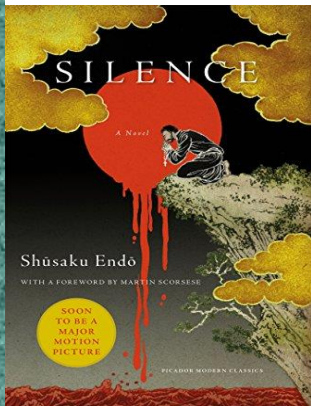
***The Color of Compromise* by Jemar Tisby**

I was exposed to Jemar Tisby because one of my friends from college works closely with him on a Christian podcast. This book (256 pages) is an emotionally difficult read, but an important one. Jemar gives a brief survey of the American church's role in slavery and racism. There are bright spots, but much of it is eye opening and lamentable. What I appreciate most about this book is that it is written by someone who deeply loves the church. It is not written to tear down, or attack the church, but to help the church be more like Christ.



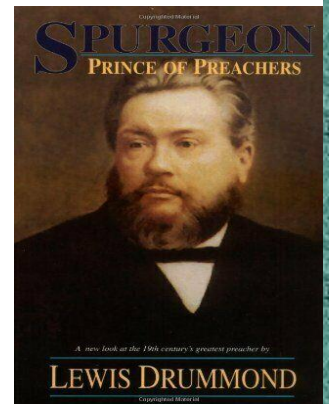
***Silence* by Endo Shusaku**

This is a fiction book written by a Japanese Catholic writer. A Jesuit priest hears rumors that his mentor has committed apostasy and abandoned the faith. He travels with a friend to Japan in the 17th century to share the gospel and search for the truth. This is a haunting story that wrestles with persecution and the silence of God in midst of our suffering.



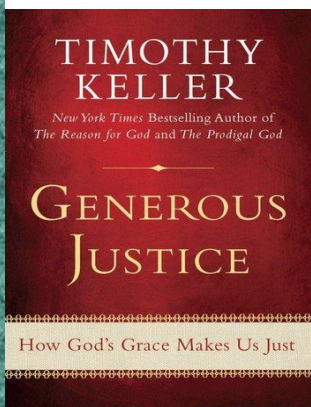
***Spurgeon: The Prince of Preachers* by Lewis A. Drummond**

This is a biography that covers the life of Charles Spurgeon, who is widely considered one of the greatest preachers of the 19th century. His sermons were spread widely throughout England and even in America. While others were abandoning the Bible and unhelpful, he continued to preach powerful expository sermons. This biography does a great job making Spurgeon come to life.



***Generous Justice: How God's Grace Makes us Just* by Tim Keller**

Tim Keller is the kind of author that I would recommend any book that he has written and this book is no exception. He is a brilliant pastor and writer, but also accessible. This book is a biblical exploration of what the Bible has to say about justice. It was eye opening to me. Before this book I never realized how much God has to say about justice in His Word. I would recommend this book to anyone who wants a more detailed explanation of what God's Word has to say about justice and racism. The page count is higher (272 pages), but it is a smaller size book.

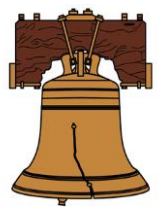

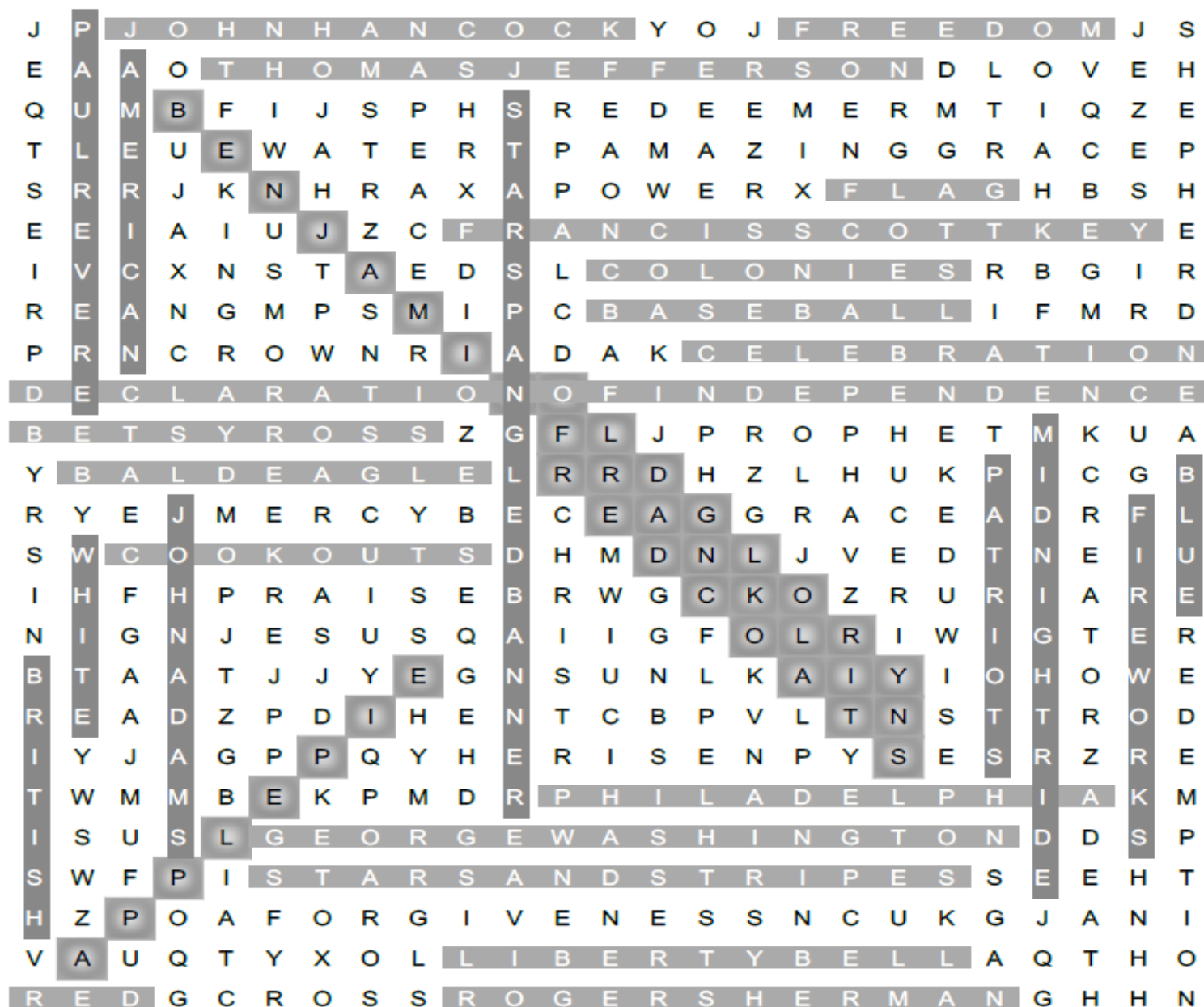
