Light of the World

"When Jesus spoke again to the people, He said, 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows Me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life.'" (John 8:12)

The Feast of Tabernacles (Sukkot) was an annual Jewish feast held six months after the Feast of the Passover. It lasted seven days and commemorated the Lord's blessings to the children of Israel during their travels in the wilderness. It also celebrated the year's harvest and marked the end of the harvest season. The Jews considered this feast the greatest and most joyful of all their feasts (Leviticus 23:34-43).

During the Feast of Tabernacles there was a great ceremony called the "Illumination of the Temple," which involved the ritual lighting of four golden oil-fed lamps in the Court of Women. These lamps were huge, seventy-five feet high menorahs which were lit in the Temple at night. All night long the light shone their brilliance -- illuminating the entire city. The illumination from these imposing Temple lamps symbolized two realities. The first reality was of the "Light of all Lights"— the Shekinah Glory—the visible presence of God that filled the first Temple, which Solomon built (1 Kings 8:10–11) and the pillar of fire that had guided Israel in their wilderness journey.

The second reality was the promise of the Great Light (Ha'or Gadol) or the return of the Shekinah glory. One who would soon come and bring light to those who were spiritually dead and dwelling in darkness (Isaiah 9:2). In celebration and anticipation, the holiest of Israel's men danced and sang psalms of joy and praise before the Lord. This festival was a reminder that God had promised to send a light, the Light, to a lost and sin-darkened world. God promised to send the Messiah to renew Israel's glory, release them from bondage, and restore their joy. First imagine that you are in ancient Jerusalem during the Feast of Tabernacles. Now, imagine seeing these massive seventy-five feet menorahs burning huge vats of olive oil creating an indescribable amount of light. (There was no electricity in those days.) Picture the impact the words Jesus spoke in the Temple courtyard when He proclaimed, "I am the Light of the world." Under no disillusion, Jesus was declaring Himself God.

Jesus is the Light, the source of illumination to bring the lost out of darkness. Jesus declared himself to be the Light of the world and in so doing, declared Himself Deity. It is not clear from the text when this incident happened, but it was sometime between the Feast of Tabernacles (John 7) and the Feast Of Dedication (Hanukkah) (John 10); both of these celebrations focused on light.

In the Old Testament Israel was supposed to be guided by a unique calendar. It was not just punctuated by harvest and planting seasons, but by special feasts. God wanted the nation to have frequent moments when they would stop and remember the ways that God had delivered them as a people. There were over seven feasts that Israel would participate in: Passover, the Feast of Unleavened Bread, the Feast of First Fruits, the Feast of Weeks, the Feast of Trumpets, the Day of Atonement, and the Feast of Tabernacles.

Each of these feasts were meant to guide the way that Israel thought about the calendar year. They were moments to stop and reflect. Each feast had its own customs and practices for how they would celebrate and remember. My personal favorite is how the entire nation would camp out for a week during the Feast of Tabernacles. I can only imagine what a campout involving an entire nation would look like. They would do this to remember how God delivered and guided them as they wandered for 40 years through the wilderness.

But these feasts were not just meant to be moments where they would remember God's faithfulness. I think that they were an attempt for Israel to root their entire year around God. That their calendar would be guided by the story of what God had done. Instead of being centered around harvest time, or the seasons Israel's calendar was centered on God.

For us as Christians today our calendars are not quite as God-centric. Most of the time our calendars are guided by the school system, our vacation days, or the college football schedule (Hook'em horns!). We do allow God to break in during Easter and Christmas time, but afterwards we quickly get back into our own routine.

The Christian calendar has fallen out of favor with most Christians today. Evangelicals especially can want to avoid it because it reeks of Roman Catholicism. However, I think that it can be a useful tool. There is no need to be legalistic, but it can help teach us to be guided by the story of the gospel instead of the world's calendar.

The Christian calendar has not just Christmas, but Advent. A month-long process of anticipating and looking forward to the coming of Jesus. At Epiphany, the Christmas story continues and we remember the rest of Jesus' life. There is the 40 days of Lent where we remember and think of Jesus journey to the cross as we get ready for Easter.

Personally, I have found the Christian calendar so helpful for my own spiritual growth. It has helped me think of Christmas and Easter as more than just single days. It has invited me to prepare and look forward to those days. It helps me from not just thinking about Christian holidays, but an entire Christian year. I wonder what it would look like if even our calendars were centered around the gospel? Maybe the Christian calendar can help us all get there.

Walk as Children of Light


Light is a gift from God. In Genesis 1 God said, "Let there be light, and there was light." God, Himself, is light and there is no darkness in Him. He is the Shekinah glory. He is the light that Moses saw on the mount and He is the light of the world.

The Old Testament describes God's light as a light to our path and a light of life. "For you have delivered me from death and my feet from stumbling, that I may walk before God in the light of life" (Psalm 56:13). "Blessed are those who have learned to acclaim You, who walk in the light of your presence, Lord" (Psalm 89:15). "Come, descendants of Jacob, let us walk in the light of the Lord" (Isaiah 2:5)

The New Testament tells us to walk as children of light (Eph. 5:8). Walking as children of light implies living out the Christian life – a slow and steady progress (sanctification) toward a lifestyle of holiness and Christ-centeredness. If we walk as children of light, we will bear fruit of the Light – the fruit of goodness, righteousness, and truth (Eph. 5:9).

But how do we know how to walk as children of light? Ephesian 5:10 tells us by doing what is acceptable to God. We must conform our attitudes, conduct, and thoughts to that which is pleasing to the Lord. Transformation of the mind through the meditation and study of God's word. We must choose to not fellowship with darkness but rather expose the darkness. The Light that shines in us is greater than the darkness. ~Glendon Thompson

We should remember to "believe in the Light while [we] have the light, so that [we] may become children of light" (John 12:36). In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven. (Matt. 5:16)

Graham Kendrick (b. 1950), a native of Blisworth, Northampton Shire, England, now resides in Kent. The son of a Baptist pastor, he began writing songs in the early 1970s and today is one of the most prolific British Christian singer-songwriters and worship leaders.

Initially trained as a teacher, he began his career as a singer/songwriter in 1972. He now has over 30 albums and 400 songs to his credit, and his songs are sung throughout the world in many languages.

Shine Jesus Shine, Graham's best-known song was written in 1987 and has proved to be enduringly popular not just in the UK but all round the world.

In a recent interview Graham said:

"This song is a prayer for revival. A songwriter can give people words to voice something which is already in their hearts but which they don't have the words or the tune to express, and I think 'Shine Jesus shine' caught a moment when people were beginning to believe once again that an impact could be made on a whole nation.

Bearing in mind the worldwide popularity of this song, perhaps the most surprising thing about the writing of it is the ordinariness of the circumstances. I had been thinking for some time about the holiness of God, and how that as a community of believers and as individuals, His desire is for us to live continually in his presence. My longing for revival in the Churches and spiritual awakening in the nation was growing, but also a recognition that we cannot stand in God's presence without 'clean hands and a pure heart'."

Beautiful Day Foundation

The Beautiful Day Foundation was founded in 2013 by Leah Miller and Michelle Johnson. Currently, they serve 15 Oklahoma elementary schools and widows across our region. The foundation is passionate about telling children one important message: kids need to know that they are seen and loved by the community they call home.

Beautiful Day's mission is not complicated. It is pure and simple, but it is also critical. It is critical to the condition of a child's heart to know they matter and to know they are seen. A child can experience extreme loneliness and/or feelings of isolation if they do not feel connected, loved, and supported where they live and go to school.

Beautiful Day is honored to be a piece of this support system in the schools and in children's lives. Beautiful Day began in Duncan, OK and in that first year 107, kids were celebrated in one school. Years later, this vision continues to spread further and further into many different communities. Beautiful Day's pure message of love is contagious!

What they offer:

Cake-A-Palooza (started 2013). Understanding the critical developmental stage of children in elementary school, Beautiful Day reaches out to these children to let them know their lives matter and that they are seen. Once a month Beautiful Day throws awesome birthday parties in elementary schools, celebrating every kid with a birthday that month. Balloons! Cards! Singing! All of it! They gather community volunteers to sit with them and tell them face-to-face, "The day they were born was a Beautiful Day! Your life and existence is worthy of being celebrated."



Kindred Community (started 2014). In the same manner, Beautiful Day reaches out to the widows of our community wanting them to know they are valued, and that Beautiful Days still lie ahead. A woman who has lost her husband is suffering with a particularly difficult kind of grief, a type of grief that really only another widow can truly understand. Every month prior to Covid-19, Kindred Community would invite widows to come together and share a meal and an experience. The women who attend find kindred souls at these events – women who can whisper "me too". In these kindred circles, perhaps the weight of grief can be shared and therefore lightened. Feelings of isolation are lessened through these monthly dinners. Today, Kindred Community seeks to unite and encourage these women through a pen pal program. Kindred Community wants these women to know their community sees them and values them! And that Beautiful Days still lie ahead.

Elisa is an Oklahoma native and has been a Tulsa resident for four years. God's Biblically expressed vision for the nations along with a growing understanding of unreached people groups led her to join International Collegiate Outreach (ICO) in 2018. She loves spicy food and is currently on staff with ICO while pursuing graduate studies at the University of Oklahoma-Tulsa campus.

How did you get your start in missions? What are you doing now in missions and its impact for Christ?

Growing up, "mission work" sounded like something foreign, exotic, and a little bit mysterious. I grew up in Duncan, OK,

and devoted my life to Jesus when I was young. Fourteen years later, I moved to Tulsa, fresh out of college and with a job I was thrilled about in neuroscience research. I planned to work for two years and then go on for my PhD.

During those two years, I joined a Sunday School class that was led by the church missions pastor. I started learning more about world missions and was encouraged to take a class called "Perspectives on the World Christian Movement". So I did. From there I learned about "unreached people groups", or people groups that are less than 2% Christian and have very little access to the Bible or information about Jesus. I learned that of the 7.6 billion people in the world, over three billion of them remain unreached. Moreover, the majority of these three billion unreached people live in countries closed to missionaries from North America.

And then I learned something else very interesting. There are almost one million international students in the U.S. each year, and over half of these internationals are from part of the globe that contains 97% of the world's unreached people groups, from a region sometimes called the 10/40 Window. The 10/40 Window refers to the area between 10 and 40 degrees north latitude, spanning North Africa, the Middle East, and parts of Asia. This is where the vast majority of unreached people groups currently reside. This is where Western missionaries are struggling to enter. This is where other major world religions have their strongholds. And every year, over half a million people from this region are coming to the United States to partake in our educational system.

Long story short, I prayerfully started looking for missions' opportunities, and ended up quitting my job to join an organization in Tulsa called International Community Outreach (ICO). ICO exists to glorify God by meeting practical and spiritual needs of international students through acts of service and through the proclamation of the gospel of Christ. It is an organization local to Tulsa that engages internationals at the

University of Tulsa (TU). TU is a small campus with a large international student population representing over 60 countries. We have recently expanded to serve internationals at OU-Tulsa and OSU-Tulsa as well. The heart of our ministry is relational evangelism; sharing the gospel and living the gospel in the context of genuine friendship. We welcome internationals, often engaging with them at their point of need. We provide services including free furniture with free delivery, English Clubs, car clinics, weekly on-campus lunches, community events, ladies' brunches . . . all the while giving the Holy Spirit His gentle moments to convey God's truth relevantly and convincingly. Discovering Jesus Bible Studies and local church visits become welcoming environments for questioners and seekers. We disciple those who come to faith and equip them to be ambassadors for Christ in their home countries. Did I mention that over half these students are from countries in the 10/40 Window?

What would be the global missions implications if international students from unreached people groups learn about Jesus while they are here, where we have the freedom, the community, and the resources (not to mention a shared language) to connect with them, and then they go back to their home country and tell others? God is taking some of the most difficult-to-reach people in the world and plopping them right in our lap. But we must be intentional about connecting with them while they are here, because they won't be here forever.

- Please pray for more laborers to go into this abundant harvest field. Muslims, Hindus, Buddhists, Taoists, and other individuals representing the unreached peoples of the world are all around us, right here in the States, and they are eager for friendship.
- Pray that we would walk in a manner worthy of the gospel in all we say and do.
- Pray that the aroma and knowledge of Christ would spread through all nations, and that more laborers and resources would be sent to the unreached peoples of the world.
- Pray for courage and boldness for internationals who must consider risking everything to follow Jesus.
- Pray for creativity and listening hearts as we navigate ministry during COVID-19.
 - Please pray for God to raise additional ministry partners to join me in serving unreached internationals. The level of service required this year led me to resign from a supplemental source of income, and I am working to raise an additional \$2,000 per month for the 2020/21 school year. 

Like many pastors I am a big fan of books. The following books are all books you can find on my bookshelf and I would be more than happy to lend them to anyone who would like to read them




Death of Ivan Ilyich by Leo Tolstoy

This is actually a short story, or novella, that is only around 60 pages. This classic centers around a man struggling with his slow death while everyone around him is thinking only about how his death will affect themselves. This is one of Tolstoy's best works. I love the way that Tolstoy wrestles with Christian themes while revealing the reality of human sinfulness. This book can be found free online and read in one sitting.

Kingdom of Ice: The Grand and Terrible Polar Voyage of the USS Jeannette by Hampton Sides

This is a book that I randomly picked up and was completely enthralled with. It is a historical work that reads like a thriller and adventure novel. It describes the arctic voyage of the USS Jeannette and the crews' struggle to survive after abandoning their ship to the ice. I had to resist googling what happened until after I finished the book. It is a remarkable story that is stranger than fiction.





Church Membership by Jonathan Leeman

Jonathan Leeman is one of my favorite modern theologians who writes about ecclesiology and the church. In this book Leeman builds a Biblical argument for what church membership is and why it matters. If you have ever thought church membership is made up and not in the Bible, I'd recommend this book. I don't always agree with Leeman, but I always appreciate how steeped in the Bible his arguments are. I love how he forces me to reconsider what I've thought about church and approach it with humility.
