# Lift Up Your Eyes

The city of Jerusalem—the center of ancient Jewish worship—is perched high upon a hill. As worshipers traveled there for one of the three main yearly Jewish festivals, they traditionally sang "Songs of Ascent" while climbing the road into the city. The Jewish priests may have sung these Songs of Ascent (also called Pilgrim Songs) as they ascended the temple steps in Jerusalem. One such psalm states, "I lift up my eyes to the hills. From where does my help come? My help comes from the Lord, Who made heaven and earth" (Psalm 121:1–2, ESV).

On his approach to Jerusalem, the pilgrim declared, "I lift my eyes to the hills," the place where God dwells. Just as Isaiah saw the Lord "sitting on a throne, high and lifted up" (Isaiah 6:1, NKJV), the psalmist looked up to the mountains of Jerusalem and saw God the Creator of heaven and earth, seated on His heavenly throne in Mount Zion.

Scripture frequently refers to the heights of Jerusalem as the holy "Mountain of the Lord" where God dwells (Zechariah 8:3; Isaiah 27:13). One psalmist describes Jerusalem as "the city of our God, which sits on His holy mountain! It is high and magnificent; the whole earth rejoices to see it! Mount Zion, the holy mountain, is the city of the great King!" (Psalm 48:1–2, NLT). In Psalm 87:2, the same writer reports that God "loves the city of Jerusalem more than any other city in Israel."

"I lift my eyes to the hills" was the worshiper's declaration of trust and dependence upon God for help. He was going to meet with the Lord and offer sacrifices of praise because the Lord his God, Creator of the universe, was his singular source of help. From the elevated place of His holy presence, God would grant assistance and deliverance: "I call out to the Lord, and He answers me from His holy mountain" (Psalm 3:4; see also Psalm 20:2; 134:3). From His sacred dwelling place, the Lord would offer everlasting security: "As the mountains surround Jerusalem, so the Lord surrounds His people both now and forevermore" (Psalm 125:2).

A Word from Pastor David Shields

TBF Family,

We will be studying the Psalms again this summer during the month of July. The Psalms have repeatedly been called the prayerbook of the Psalms. This means that the Psalms teach us how to pray. Israel would repeatedly pray and sing the Psalms during their worship and during their ordinary life.

Instead of focusing just on how the Psalms teach us to pray I wanted to look at the different ways the Psalms speak about blessing. Sometimes it describes the way we should praise God. Other times it describes a state that God bestows upon certain people.

During July we will look at a number of them to see what these different Psalms have to teach us. I am planning on us looking at Psalms 32, 34, 67, 84, and 103 but not necessarily in that order.

I also am planning to spend a few Wednesday nights this summer talking about sexuality and anthropology. In other words, we are going to study what the Bible says about what it means to be human and our sexuality. We will talk about what the Bible says about sex, sexual immorality, pornography, sexual idolatry, and LGBTQ+ issues. I want us to study the Scriptures and closely examine common objections.

I also want us to look inward. One of the worst ways to study the Bible is to study it hoping to find out why others are wrong. We need to look inward as well. I believe that the church has accepted far more of the world's teaching on sexuality and humanhood than we realize.

I don't want to just talk about what the Bible says is true, but also what it means for us. How do we love and bear witness to Jesus in a culture that does not have a Biblical view of personhood or sexuality? How can we engage and talk with those who disagree with us or find us hateful?

I don't have all of the answers but it's something important that we should labor to understand better together. I would also ask that you pray for me as I prepare to teach on these things. I want to correct our cultural misunderstandings with gentleness while remaining faithful to Christ.


In another song of ascent, the psalmist makes a similar pronouncement of trust and reliance on God for help: "To You I lift up my eyes, O You who are enthroned in the heavens! Behold, as the eyes of servants look to the hand of their master, as the eyes of a maidservant to the hand of her mistress, so our eyes look to the Lord our God, till He has mercy upon us" (Psalm 123:1–2, ESV). This time God is not perceived as dwelling in the hills of Jerusalem but enthroned in the heavens, and it is His mercy the psalmist seeks.

Directing our eyes toward God symbolizes our complete trust and reliance on Him for help: "But my eyes are toward You, O God, my Lord; in You I seek refuge; leave me not defenseless!" (Psalm 141:8, ESV). "My eyes are always on the Lord, for He rescues me from the traps of my enemies," acknowledged King David (Psalm 25:15, NLT). The writer of Hebrews taught us to stay the course and finish the race of the Christian life by "fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith" (Hebrews 12:2).

Lifting our eyes toward God is a biblical image of prayer. As a great multitude of enemies came against Jehoshaphat, he prayed to the Lord, "We do not know what to do, but our eyes are on You" (2 Chronicles 20:12). At his stoning, Stephen prayed and "looked up to heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at the right hand of God" (Acts 7:55). Even Jesus Himself "lifted up his eyes to heaven" when He prayed to His Father (John 17:1).

When we say, "I lift my eyes to the hills," we communicate a trust in God that can sustain us through every danger, hardship, and challenge along life's journey until we are safely home in God's eternal kingdom.

As a young single mother Homer and Pam came to my home and helped me install a window air conditioner in my first little house. That will always be a treasured and grateful memory.


There are a multitude of moments from my life where we have laughed and cried together, each memory a precious part of me.



Like many pastors, I am a big fan of books. The following books are all books you can find on my bookshelf, and I would be more than happy to lend them to anyone who would like to read them.





### Boxers and Saints by Gene Luen Yang

These is two graphic novels that follow two children on opposite sides of the Boxer Rebellion in China. Boxers follows a young boy named Bao who ends up a leader in this rebellious movement to defeat the foreigners and their religious followers. The second story follows a young girl named Four-Girl who eventually finds a home in the Christian faith. I loved it. The story was infectious and nuanced. It forces you to see both sides of the same conflict. As a Christian pastor, I appreciated the way the story handled religion. It is an honest account filled with the beauty, weaknesses, and even critique of religion that still ends with the beauty of the gospel. This is a story that I will return to and will not quickly forget. I think that even those who do not typically enjoy comics/graphic novels will find much to enjoy here. This is a deep story with plenty of layers underneath if you are willing to look.

### Boom Town: The Fantastical Saga of Oklahoma City, Its Chaotic Founding... Its Purloined Basketball Team, and the Dream of Becoming a World-class Metropolis by Sam Anderson

This is a fascinating and often hilarious story of OKC told through its history, weather, and NBA team. I found myself laughing at loud in some sections. The book zig-zags between each of these topics in small chapters and somehow manages to blend them all together in one cohesive story of a unique city. I don't know much about Oklahoma history nor anything about OKC, but I had a lot of fun reading this book. Some of you will have to read it so you can tell me what is and is not accurate. Warning that it does have some strong language in a few places.





### My Body Is Not A Prayer Request by Amy Kenny

Disabled people are made in the image of God and should be treated accordingly. Unfortunately, the reality is that the disabled are often mistreated, ignored, shoved to the side, treated as less than human, and much more. This should not be so. It especially should not be true in churches, but we seem to be the worst at times. This book feels part memoir, part theology, and part sermonic. It's hard to pin down in any category other than to say that it should be read. It gives you a picture of what life as a disabled person is actually like. It is not a false inspirational only story, nor is it a story of simply suffering and lament. It is a human story. The story of a woman made in the image of God who has something to teach us. There is so much Christianese and faulty theology this book reveals and corrects. She does good theological and biblical work. She mines Biblical stories and texts to show what they actually say about disability and God. I found myself having to reconsider texts in a new light. I also learned how hurtful the cliches Christians spew truly are. I received a digital review copy of this book, so it technically is not on my shelves, but it is worth buying.
