The Mercy Seat

The writer to the Hebrews talks about the arrangement of the tabernacle of the Old Testament. The tabernacle was the portable sanctuary used by the Israelites from the time of their wandering in the wilderness after the Exodus from Egypt to the building of the temple in Jerusalem (see Exodus 25–27). Within the tabernacle was the ark of the covenant which included the mercy seat (Hebrews 9:3-5 NKJV).

The ark of the covenant, the chest containing the two stone tablets inscribed with the Ten Commandments, was the most sacred object of the tabernacle and later in the temple in Jerusalem, where it was placed in an inner area called the Holy of Holies. Also within the ark were the golden pot of manna, such as was provided by God in the wilderness wanderings (Exodus 16:4), and Aaron's almond rod (Numbers 17:1-13). On top of the ark was a lid called the mercy seat on which rested the cloud or visible symbol of the divine presence. Here God was supposed to be seated, and from this place He was supposed to dispense mercy to man when the blood of the atonement was sprinkled there.

In a manner of speaking, the mercy seat concealed the people of God from the ever-condemning judgment of the Law. Each year on the Day of Atonement, the high priest entered the Holy of Holies and sprinkled the blood of animals sacrificed for the atonement of the sins of God's people. This blood was sprinkled on the mercy seat. The point conveyed by this imagery is that it is only through the offering of blood that the condemnation of the Law could be taken away and violations of God's laws covered.

The Greek word for "mercy seat" in Hebrews 9:5 is hilasterion, which means "that which makes expiation" or "propitiation." It carries the idea of the removal of sin. In Ezekiel 43:13-15, the brazen altar of sacrifice is also called hilasterion (the propitiatory or mercy seat) in the Septuagint (the Greek translation of the Old Testament) because of its association with the shedding of blood for sin.

A Word from Pastor David Shields

TBF Church Family,

This month we have a gift for our church, made available thanks to the generosity of Crossway. We have 50 copies of the book *Praying the Bible* by Donald S. Whitney. They will be available in the foyer for you to pick up. Feel free to grab an extra copy for a friend or anyone you think might be blessed by it.

The book is a practical guide on prayer. Specifically, it teaches a method of prayer that is fueled by Scripture. The method is simple and straightforward. You will probably grasp it within a chapter or two, but the entire book is short and worth reading in its entirety.

The goal of this method is not to change the way you read your Bible, but the way that you pray. The basic method is to slowly read through a verse or passage of the Bible and then pray based on what the words bring to mind. You read Ecclesiastes 5:1 "Guard your steps when you go to the house of God" and then pray something like "Lord, forgive me for how often I do not guard my steps. Would You help me to be careful in my worship." Then you move on to the next verse and keep praying.


This method will teach you how to pray Biblical prayers. Because you are simply praying the words of Scripture, you will learn to pray in line with God's Word. One reason I preach through books of the Bible is that it forces us to confront things that we do not like to talk about. Praying this way forces us to pray about things that we might otherwise ignore.

This is a method of prayer that I often use in my own prayer life. I have found that it helps sustain my prayers when I do not have enough stamina. Sometimes I know I should pray or I am emotionally distressed and desire to pray, but I run out of words and do not know what to say. This method of just praying through verses gives you fuel for your words.

I have also found that it helps my wandering mind. It makes it more difficult to be distracted when there is always another verse to pray next. This is not the only way to pray, but it is a helpful one. Most of us will admit that our prayer lives are not where we wish they were. I think that this book and method of prayer can help us pray more biblical prayers.

I hope that it blesses your prayer life. I would love to hear what you think of the book after you read it.

What is the significance of this? In the New Testament, Christ Himself is designated as our "propitiation." Paul explains this in his letter to the Romans: "Being justified freely by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God set forth as a propitiation by His blood, through faith, to demonstrate His righteousness, because in His forbearance God had passed over the sins that were previously committed" (Romans 3:24-25 NKJV). What Paul is teaching here is that Jesus is the covering for sin, as shown by these Old Testament prophetic images. By means of His death, and our response to Christ through our faith in Him, all our sins are covered. Also, whenever believers sin, we may turn to Christ who continues to be the propitiation or covering for our sins (1 John 2:1, 4:10). This ties together the Old and New Testament concepts regarding the covering of sin as exemplified by the mercy-seat of God.


Happy October Everyone!

This month I wanted to share two books with you. They are *The Excellent Wife* by Martha Peace and *The Exemplary Husband* by Stuart Scott. You may notice that these titles are similar and that is because they are companion books to one another. There is an uncountable amount of marriage books - some from a Christian worldview, some from a non-Christian worldview, and others who 'Christianize' secular thought for marriage. Sadly, many well-known marriage books fall into this last category; and while these books can help with certain issues, this is hugely problematic because we do not need to look to the lost world for knowledge of something the scriptures speak deeply about. The beauty of *The Excellent Wife* and *Exemplary Husband* is that they begin with God, building a solid foundation to talk from a Biblical worldview.

Each of these books takes a look at what the Bible says about marriage from the Biblical perspective and how these Biblical truths can be applied to marriages in our time. I can honestly say that out of all of the marriage books that I had to read in my Biblical counseling classes in seminary and the ones I read while engaged to Hannah, these two books are some of the bests I've read. They are written to be easily read. While they speak about big ideas, they do it in a way that anyone can understand - from a new believer to a seasoned saint.

Our marriages are called to reflect Christ and His Church as a spiritual and practical example, and while books cannot fix the issue, The *Excellent Wife and Exemplary Husband* each point to the One who can in both piratical applications and mindset changes. I implore you to read them if things don't 'feel right' anymore or even if you simply want to see how to make your marriage reflect Jesus even more!

Paved the way of TBF History -- A Path of Remembrance



William "Bill" Dickinson — William Warren "Bill" Dickinson was a founding member of Tanglewood Bible Fellowship. He and his wife, Mama Jo, reared four children — Jack Dickinson, Bill Dickinson (Jr.), Susan Dickinson (Moore), and Mary Jo Dickinson (Smith). Bill received a Chemical Engineering degree from Oklahoma University (1950). He was a veteran of WWII and served as an assistant with the Manhattan Project during the war. After the war, Bill worked for Sun Oil Refinery in Corpus Christi (TX) and was plant manager for Sun Oil in Meridian (OK). Later he would work for Tosco before retiring.

A very intelligent man. Bill was driven and liked to see projects completed. He would sing bombastically during worship even though it was said he couldn't carry a tune. He was called "Papa Bill" but only because he was married to TBF's beloved Mama Jo. If Bill was

the brains behind TBF, Mama Jo was the heart.

"Mama Jo" Dickinson – Josephine Elizabeth "Jo (Sanborn) Dickinson was a founding member of Tanglewood Bible Fellowship. Her name was synonymous with faith and fun. Mama Jo was an encourager and always complimented people. She encouraged others to never give up – no matter the circumstances. She sent cards all the time and headed a prayer ministry. Mama Jo's smile and laughter were contagious – no matter what was going on – from a silly hat party to a women's trip, she kept the merriment going. During the early days of TBF, there were few children. The Blalack's kids were the only little ones. Mama Jo prayed for kids, and God answered in a big way – 8 TBFers got pregnant!

Bill and Mama Jo were devoted to the Lord and had a passion about following their calling to start a new Bible church. They were fun people, always welcomed you in their home.

Bill (d. 1999) and Mama Jo (d. 1999) are buried at Duncan Municipal Cemetery.



Dep Cox - Dep Cox was a long-time member of Tanglewood Bible Fellowship. He and his wife, Lovella, reared three children – Homer Cox, Joann Cox (Draper), and Neta Cox. Dep was a private in the US Army during WWII and later worked as an electronic technician for the Naval Weapons Center in El Centro (CA).


Dep enjoyed singing and fishing but loved baseball. He didn't like the fact that the Tanglewood Tiger's didn't have full baseball uniforms, so he purchased the whole team complete uniforms! It made him happy to watch the Tanglewood Tigers softball team for many years. (The Tanglewood Tigers were the softball champs in 1999 and 2000.)

Lovella Cox — Lovella Cox was a long-time member of Tanglewood Bible Fellowship. She and Dep did everything together. Lovella was the most kind and gentle person most have ever known. She loved her family and the Lord so much. She was the best mother, mother-in-law, and grandmother to all her grandchildren.

Dep (d. 2003) and Lovella (d. 1997) are buried at Duncan Municipal Cemetery.

Like many pastors, I am a big fan of books. The following books are all books you can find on my bookshelf, and I would be more than happy to lend them to anyone who would like to read them.





The Apostolic Fathers translated by J. B. Lightfoot

These are letters and books written by Christians a generation or two after the apostles and the book of Acts. It's an incredible blessing that the church still has access to these works. Some of these letters are written to the same churches that received many books of the Bible. The church in Corinth partially continually seems to have sin issues and dysfunction. Some vary in difficulty (looking at you Shepherd of Hermas), but most are readable, applicable, and relevant. I would encourage every Christian to at least read the Martyrdom of Polycarp. You are welcome to borrow my copy, or you should easily find it for free online.

Strange Rites: New Religions for a Godless World by Tara Isabella Burton

More and more our society claims it is godlessness, however, it has not abandoned religion it has simply transformed it. This book chronicles a wide range of ways, some stranger than others, that non-Christians have kept the trappings of religion while refusing to call it that. This is more of a sociological book than a "Christian" one, but it is profoundly helpful in understanding our current cultural context.





Breaking the Idols of Your Heart: How to Navigate the Temptations of Life by Dan B. Allende & Temper Longman III

This book is about Ecclesiastes but is not exactly a Bible study nor a commentary. The book is separated into two parts: the first part is a narrative story, and the second part is the biblical content of the book. Each chapter begins with the story of Noah, his wife Joan, and their Bible study in Ecclesiastes. I don't normally like this kind of thing in my books, but I was particularly grabbed by this story. I think it works and served the book well. The book itself interprets Ecclesiastes according to the idols that it destroys. Each chapter is focused on a different idol like control, pleasure, money, etc. If you want a book on idolatry or something relatively easy on Ecclesiastes, then this is a good place to start.
