# Day of Pentecost

Pentecost is significant in both the Old and New Testaments. "Pentecost" is actually the Greek name for a festival known in the Old Testament as the Feast of Weeks (Leviticus 23:15; Deuteronomy 16:9). The Greek word means "fifty" and refers to the fifty days that have elapsed since the wave offering of Passover. The Feast of Weeks celebrated the end of the grain harvest. Most interesting, however, is its use in Joel and Acts. Looking back to Joel's prophecy (Joel 2:28–32) and forward to the promise of the Holy Spirit in Christ's last words on earth before His ascension into heaven (Acts 1:8), Pentecost signals the beginning of the church age.

The only biblical reference to the actual events of Pentecost is Acts 2:1–3. Pentecost is reminiscent of the Last Supper; in both instances the disciples are together in a house for what proves to be an important event. At the Last Supper the disciples witness the end of the Messiah's earthly ministry as He asks them to remember Him after His death until He returns. At Pentecost, the disciples witness the birth of the New Testament church in the coming of the Holy Spirit to indwell all believers. Thus the scene of the disciples in a room at Pentecost links the commencement of the Holy Spirit's work in the church with the conclusion of Christ's earthly ministry in the upper room before the crucifixion.

The description of fire and wind mentioned in the Pentecost account resounds throughout the Old and the New Testament. The sound of the wind at Pentecost was "rushing" and "mighty." Scriptural references to the power of wind (always understood to be under God's control) abound. Exodus 10:13; Psalm 18:42 and Isaiah 11:15 in the Old Testament and Matthew 14:23–32 in the New Testament are only a few examples. More significant than wind as power is wind as life in the Old Testament (Job 12:10) and as spirit in the New (John 3:8). Just as the first Adam received the breath of physical life (Genesis 2:7), so the last Adam, Jesus, brings the breath of spiritual life. The idea of spiritual life as generated by the Holy Spirit is certainly implicit in the sound of the wind at Pentecost.

Fire is often associated in the Old Testament with the presence of God (Exodus 3:2; 13:21–22; 24:17; Isaiah 10:17) and with His holiness (Psalm 97:3; Malachi 3:2). Likewise, in the New Testament, fire is associated with the presence of God (Hebrews 12:29) and the purification He can bring about in human life (Revelation 3:18). God's presence and holiness are implied in the Pentecostal tongues of fire. Indeed, fire is identified with Christ Himself (Revelation 1:14; 19:12); this association naturally underlies the Pentecost gift of the Holy Spirit, who would teach the disciples the things of Christ (John 16:14).

Another aspect of the Day of Pentecost is the miraculous speaking in foreign tongues which enabled people from various language groups to understand the message of the apostles. In addition is the bold and incisive preaching of Peter to a Jewish audience. The effect of the sermon was powerful, as listeners were "cut to the heart" (Acts 2:37) and instructed by Peter to "repent and be baptized" (Acts 2:38). The narrative concludes with three thousand souls being added to the fellowship, the breaking of bread and prayers, apostolic signs and wonders, and a community in which everyone's needs were met.

A Word from Pastor David Shields

Church family,

We are returning this month to our study of the Gospel of Luke in chapter 9. You may remember that the Gospel of Luke is separated in mostly geographical sections. Jesus's early days preparing for ministry (1:1-4:13) and His ministry in Galilee (4:14-9:49) are the two primary sections we have studied so far. But this chapter contains a physical turning point that leads us to our next section. In chapter nine verse fifty-one, it says: <u>*"When the days drew near for Him to be taken up, He set His face to go to Jerusalem."*</u> This is the largest section of the Gospel of Luke. From 9:51 to 19:27 Jesus will be heading toward Jerusalem.


Most of Jesus's ministry takes place in this journey toward Jerusalem. This is not just Jesus heading toward the capital city in order to maximize His reach. Jesus is heading to Jerusalem because <u>"the</u> <u>days drew near"</u>. The time for His crucifixion and resurrection is at hand. The countdown clock has started, and Jesus needs to head in that direction.

<u>"He set His face to go to Jerusalem."</u> This means that Jesus was determined to go to Jerusalem. Nothing could change or redirect His path. He was determined; focused on His mission. It is important for us to recognize that all of Jesus's ministry is directed towards the cross. Every miracle, conversation, parable, and teaching is done in light of what the cross will accomplish. The death and resurrection are the climax of the story and the revelation of everything that Jesus meant.

Much like Jesus, we are headed toward Jerusalem. Not the physical Jerusalem located in modern day Israel. We are heading toward the New Jerusalem that is to come when Christ returns. And, like Jesus, we should set our faces. We should not be tempted to look back while our hands are on the plow. We should not look to our world with longing like Lot's wife. We should set our hearts on the world that is to come.

I am excited to continue our study of Luke's gospel together. I hope our study of Christ will help us grow in our love and affection for our Savior. I also hope we keep in mind how everything Jesus does relates to the cross and the Gospel. Because we cannot understand the Gospel unless we understand the cross.



Happy July church family,


This past month the youth got the opportunity to attend youth camp, thanks to you all. Because of the kindness you all showed with your donations at the Valentine's Day dinner and other instances, we were able to let the kids attend camp for a discounted price. We also felt everyone's prayers throughout the week. As youth leaders, we combined three churches with different backgrounds; about thirty kids whom each had their own temperaments and who were at different places in their walk with Christ. As you can imagine, there were plenty of disagreements, butting of heads, and differences in thought. However, God used it all for the kids' good and to glorify His name.

There were many exciting activities that they had for the kids, from zip lining to water obstacle courses to simply swimming in the lake. They recently installed a high ropes course and a low ropes course, both of which they used for team building. Falls Creek also had some special events for the kids, like Nintendo Switch tournaments and a Silent Disco where they had headphones with three channels for the kids to switch between and dance to. Another very important event that occurred at camp was pin trading. Kids and leaders had binders filled with little metal pins that they would trade with one another.

Spiritually they stayed true to the theme and spoke about Jesus, and how He should be first, now, only, and always. The focus was on 1 Timothy 2:3-7 in the morning teachings and walking through the Gospel of Mark in the evenings. They also helped teach the kids evangelism tools to help them feel more confident in sharing their faith. The guest speaker they had was able to tell stories that hooked people's attention and had a very good ability to bring complex thoughts down to a level that even the middle schoolers in Tabernacle could understand.

### Youth Volunteer Spotlight: Nichole Love









Tom grew up in a farmhouse full of laughter and shenanigans with his five siblings in Gobles, MI: Terry (Janet) Odell of Gobles, MI; Teresa (Gene) Dillenbeck of Gobles, MI; Tracy (Mary) Odell of Greenwood, AR; Tod (Linda) Odell of Bloomingdale, MI; and Tammy (Max) Thompson of Sheffield, IL. He graduated from Gobles High School in 1969 and Grand Rapids School of Bible and Music with a degree in Christian Ministry/Bible where he enjoyed being active in ministry and traveling singing groups.

He met the love of his life of almost 51 years, Beverly (Barker) Odell of Wyanet while at college. They were married June 24th, 1972. He was a devoted and loving father to their two children, Kimberly (Chuck) of Manhattan, KS and Curtis (Jessica) of Princeton. His 8 grandchildren quickly became a source of great joy. 

#### Calvin's Company of Pastors: Pastoral Care and the Emerging Reformed Church, 1536-1609 by Scott M. Manetsch





good, the bad, and the very ugly. It is a wonderful example of what scholarship should be. It is impeccably researched. Footnotes and primary sources are mentioned all over the place. It gets deep into the weeds and leaves no stone unturned. He has no problem talking about the dark parts of life in Geneva (the racial bias towards French ministers, the mistreatment of rural pastors, and overly extreme cases of church discipline).

It is also focused on trying to help the church and leads to application. The book doesn't read like a dry account of life in the 16th century. It is a vivid retelling, and you can feel the struggle pastors felt during those days.

#### Leviticus: Holy God, Holy People by Kenneth A. Matthews

I am a fan of this commentary series, but this is one of the better volumes. The book is adapted from a series of sermons from Matthews who preached through the entire book of Leviticus. The sermons are theologically and exegetically rich while remaining accessible for lay people. I think that anyone who wanted to study Leviticus on a deeper level would benefit from this book. I especially appreciate the author's focus on connecting Leviticus to the Gospel and Jesus.

#### **Reflections on Revival by Charles Grandison Finney**

Charles Finney was a revival preacher during the Second Great Awakening and is the father of much of modern evangelism. This book is a series of letters Finney published at a later stage of his life. They are reflections on the revival scene and the dangers and issues that he sees.

I am not a fan of Finney nor of his theology. Yet, I found myself agreeing with him far more than I expected. I think I would have enjoyed the book more if I was less familiar with his work. I think this book is worthwhile for those who want to know how his views on revivals were slowly shifting. He recognized some of the dangers, but I don't think he went far enough.
