In His Image

On the sixth day of creation, God did something He had not done before. When He created the world and everything in it, He merely spoke it all into existence (Genesis 1). But on the sixth day, He reached down into the clay and formed a man. He then "breathed into man's nostrils the breath of life and man became a living soul" (Genesis 2:7). The breath of God created an eternal soul in the man. God made mankind in His own image; that is, Adam and Eve were more like Him than anything else He had created (Genesis 1:27). Humans would live forever, just as God will. He told the first couple to be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it (verse 28). He had created them for a purpose, and all the people that came after them were created for a purpose, too.

Scattered throughout the Bible are hints about the reasons God made us. Our first hint is in the Garden of Eden. Genesis 2:15 says that God took the man He had created and put him in the garden to tend it. God had created a caretaker for His earth. He gave man dominion over everything else and gave him a job to do (Genesis 1:28). Man's first job was naming all the animals (Genesis 2:19–20). God could have named the animals Himself, but He enjoyed working with Adam the way a loving parent enjoys watching her preschooler learn a skill. So we were created for work, but not work in the way we usually define it. Work was designed to be a fulfilling way we experience God by working in harmony with Him to accomplish His goals.

We know from Psalm 139:13–16 that we were each formed by God while inside our mothers. We are His masterpieces, created by Him for unique purposes (Ephesians 2:10). God is intimately involved in our creation: "The word of the LORD came to me, saying: 'Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I set you apart and appointed you a prophet to the nations'" (Jeremiah 1:4–5). That statement alone should overwhelm us with wonder. The Lord God Almighty, Creator of the universe, chooses us individually and then creates us exactly as He wants us to be. Scripture is clear that every human being was created by God for His pleasure and His purpose (Colossians 1:16).

If we are going to fulfill our purpose, we need to consult the Bible. The Bible tells us about who God is, who we are, and how we should live our lives. Many people try to find purpose in happiness, fun, or popularity because they are unaware that God has greater purpose for their lives. Sadly they end up empty and frustrated. But they don't need to. God has given us His Word (the Bible) so that we could learn who He is and who we are. When we consult it for direction, we have opened the roadmap that leads to our purpose.

A Word from Pastor David Shields

Tanglewood Family,

One of the central doctrines I remind my children of each day is the Imago Dei, or the idea that every human being is made in the image of God. I remind them that they are made in the image of God and so is everyone they will see today. This daily repetition has helped me realize how foundational and essential this belief is. Here are a few examples of the implications being made in the image of God has for our theology.

Being made in the image of God means every human life has inherent worth. Every human being's life has value because we reflect part of who God is. The world tells us that our worth and value comes from our function or what we produce. The problem with that view is that logically implies the disabled, elderly, and unborn are less valuable.

The image of God should ground how we treat other people. We treat other people as if they are made in God's image. I continually have to remind not only my children but myself as well. We are not just to love our neighbor because God says so. We are to treat them with love because how we treat them reflects how we feel about God.

The image of God is the foundation of our ethics. The way we make moral decisions and decide what actions are and are not acceptable should be grounded in the worth of human beings. Our response to abortion, euthanasia, genocide, capital punishment, etc must be founded on the idea that each human being is made in God's image.

Being made in the image of God should ground our view of ourselves. We have value just because of who we are. Not because of anything we accomplish. Not because of anything we have done or believe. Our value simply comes from being made by God. Nothing we have failed to do can take away from our value and nothing we do can add to it.

We believe that each human being was made in the image of God but that Jesus Christ is the perfect and complete image of God. This means the human body of Jesus was eternally made in the image of God in a similar way to us. Jesus gives us the example of what fully imaging God should look like.

This is just a small taste of the implications of being made in God's image. Each day that I meditate on this simple truth I am amazed at how deep it goes. Most of Christian theology, in one way or another, can tie back into the image of God. Remember as you go through this month that you and everyone you see is made in the image of God. Treat them and yourself like this is true.

One thing we learn is that God loves us and proved that love by sending His Son, Jesus, to show us what He is like (John 14:9). Although God loves us, our sin has separated us from Him (Romans 3:23; 6:23). Jesus came to earth and offered Himself in our place. He took the punishment our sin deserves (2 Corinthians 5:21). God raised Him from the dead three days later, proving that Jesus is Lord over everything, including death (Romans 10:9–10). Then God decreed that everyone who places faith in Jesus will be forgiven and enter a relationship with Him (John 3:16–18). So God's first desire for every human being is that we come to know Him through faith in His Son. When we know who He is, we can discover who we are.

God's goal for each of His children is that we take on a family resemblance. He wants us to be like Jesus (Romans 8:29). So He gives us spiritual gifts that enable us to serve Him in supernatural ways (1 Peter 4:10; 1 Corinthians 12:7–11). As we learn to walk in harmony with God and use our gifts to serve others, we are living our purpose.

God created us for a purpose, but that purpose will look different for every person because we are each unique. To be created in the image of God means that we were created to be mirrors of God's glory—one-of-a-kind mirrors that reflect the diverse aspects of His nature. A mirror serves no other purpose than to reflect something else. A mirror is useless when covered in mud; likewise, when we are covered in sin and turned away from God, we are not living out the purpose for which we were created. But when we respond to God's offer of salvation and allow His Holy Spirit to clean us up, we turn toward our Creator, and His glory is reflected in our lives. It is not our light or beauty the world needs to see, but His (John 8:12; 9:5).

Micah 6:8 tells us what God expects from us: "He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." God created us to walk with Him, talk with Him, discover His attributes, and bless the world from that perspective. To act justly is to hold ourselves to a higher standard than our old sin natures followed (1 Corinthians 10:31). We seek to learn God's commands so we can obey them. To love mercy is to become channels of the same mercy and grace that rescued us (Titus 3:5). We offer forgiveness to those who offend us and leave final judgment to God (1 Corinthians 4:5). We walk humbly with our God when we stay close to Him in good times and bad, thanking Him for every good gift and running to Him when we feel threatened (1 Thessalonians 5:18; Proverbs 18:10). When we walk humbly with our God, we store up treasure in heaven as we seek to know and follow His will. By living our lives on earth for His glory, we can one day step into His presence knowing that we have fulfilled the purpose for which He created us (1 Timothy 6:18–19; Matthew 6:20; Luke 19:17).

Then God said, "Let Us make man in Our image, after Our likeness. And let them have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over the livestock and over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth." Genesis 1:26

All men are invited. If you need materials for the study, please see Wolfgang Deeg. He usually has copies with him at church.



Happy May, Church Family!

This month, spring has set in, and summer is hot on its tail. I want to talk about the importance of being outside. As I write this newsletter, I am dealing with allergies, and the thought of being outside does not sound pleasant. But all the more, sunshine and the great outdoors are important not only for our physical health but also our spiritual health in two ways.

One of the major ways nature helps us is by showing us the majesty of God. Everything on earth was created by God. We can acknowledge this fact on a logical level and understand that all of the creation points to God, but, especially when we are struggling, we can forget this. When Job loses everything—his riches, health, and children, and his wife tells him to simply curse God and die—Job is distraught and depressed. Throughout the middle 36 chapters of Job, we see him attempt to argue that he is a good man and that he has a desire to bring his case before God to see why bad things had to happen to him. In chapter 38, the Lord appears before Job and begins to speak to him. While we would think that God would comfort Job in his time of pain or perhaps explain the cosmic working of the world and the purpose of Job's tests, God instead, in four chapters, begins to remind Job of His power over all of creation, from His stopping of the tide in its a place (38:8-11), to His power over pregnancy (39:1-4), and even His power over the cosmos (38:31-33). When we stand out in nature and breathe in a fresh breath of air it is easier to relax. It is impossible to look at the beauty of nature and think about ourselves. This past month, during the solar eclipse, I did not hear any person talking about how amazing they were as a person in the same breath as they spoke about the grandness of the moon blocking the sun from view. Nature has a way of rightsizing us. We are important to God and created in His image. We have great value, but we can focus too deeply on ourselves and begin to shift our focus inward, causing a spiral. But nature is a note that God gives us of His majesty and grandeur. He not only affixes each star in its place, but He also knows each hair on our head and each feeling we feel. God's creation is also able to expose the darkness of our lives. Pastor John Piper has been quoted saying.

"The reason strip clubs board up their windows is not primarily to stop passersby from unpaid peeks. Instead, it is to stop paying customers from looking out and seeing the sky. The owners know that if customers see the heavens, they will be reminded that a vast sky full of stars or clouds hovers above them—and mutely refutes the folly of ascribing worth to a passing pseudo-pleasure."

I really love this quote because it brings out an important truth of our lives, namely, sin hides in the dark, and under imitation light it is easier to ignore the true light. This is part of the same reason that most casinos also have no windows anywhere near the gambling floor or typically by the buffet or bar. This escalates with the "portals to hell" that each of us keeps in our pockets, and while I do appreciate technology, it is an unnatural area. This is part of the reason that social media can be so damaging. People believe that they are able to "live" without ever leaving their homes. And much like our bodies need vitamin D from the sun to live, nature is also a spiritual vitamin that God has given us: it is a need as well.

We need a lot more than nature to be healthy Christians; we also need community, scripture, prayer, and a humble attitude. At least personally, I have noticed that I never think about the importance of nature, and it can be a detriment. So this month, as the flowers begin to bloom and we have to wash the yellow off of our cars, I challenge you to breathe in deep (or as deep as you dare), look at the clouds, and thank God for all the blessings He has given you.



Like many pastors, I am a big fan of books. The following books are all books you can find on my bookshelf, and I would be more than happy to lend them to anyone who would like to read them.




The Secular Creed: Engaging Five Contemporary Claims by Rebecca McLaughlin


This small book is an incredible resource engaging claims the world makes. She engages each of these five credal statements, "Black Lives Matter, Love is Love, Gay Rights are Civil Rights, Women's Right Are Human Rights, and Transgender Women are Women," with compassion and conviction. Each argument is presented in its best possible light with the strongest arguments favoring that position. She then tackles how the BIble affirms or rejects part of the statement and ends with how each claim finds its ultimate fulfillment in Christ. I wish more books were written with the kind of civility and clarity as this one.

Fruitful Theology: How the life of the Mind Leads to the Life of the Soul by Ronni Kurtz

This book made me love Jesus more. The central premise is that studying theology should lead to the fruit of the spirit becoming more evident in our lives. This is not necessarily a new premise, but it is a needed reminder in our day and age. I could feel each chapter spurring me on to be more like Jesus. The chapters follow a different fruit of the spirit and show how theology should lead to growing that fruit in our lives. I wish I would have read this before I started Bible college or seminary.



Uncommon Decency: Christian Civility in an Uncivil World by Richard J. Mouw



I picked this up for a quarter at a local library sale and it blew me away. Two central premises guide the book. The first is that we need to treat and talk to other people like they are made in the image of God. Incivility is not just being unkind or acting unChristian but is fundamentally denying the imago dei. The second premise is that civility takes strong convictions seriously. His arguments for accepting nuance do not mean accepting the vagueness of plurality. Instead, civility is honest and clear about its convictions and the clear convictions of ideological opponents. It was refreshing to see a vision of civility that did not flatten issues or make them seem less important. Rather the focus is on how to have a passionate discussion without resorting to sin. Overall, this is a needed and helpful book in our age. Christians should have strong convictions and be able have a civil conversation with those they believe are seriously wrong.
